



The Investment Club is a small group of students who have a strong passion for the stock market, management of funds, and personal financial success. In the investment club our members learn how to calculate the intrinsic value of a stock, manage money, and try to predict market trends. We evaluate our current holdings and research potential new investments. Our club has only been around for a few years, but we have seen great success. We started with \$50,000 in an investment account and we have grown it to over \$72,000! Some of our greatest investments have been Costco and JPMorgan Chase. At present, we are looking to optimize our portfolio by selling underperforming stocks and researching new companies to invest in. As always, our goal is to continue to learn, adapt, and grow as investors.

The table above represents the gains that the Investment Club has made through their investments in the stock market. The stocks that they have chosen to invest in include Costco, HSBC Holdings, Ingersoll Rand, JPMorgan Chase & Co., Microsoft, Toyota, and Valero Energy Corporation. To begin with, the investment club put \$49,253.75 into these specific stocks. Overtime, they have accumulated a 46 percent appreciation from their investments, bringing their total account value to \$75,340.39 (with cash and cash investments deducted) as of November 13th, 2024.

SALARY NEGOTIATION WORKSHOP


On November 20th, approximately 50 UD students in Professor Molly Hein's Negotiation and Conflict Management class participated in a collective bargaining exercise with the Dubuque Area Labor-Management Council. This event gave students the opportunity to gain hands-on experience and connect what they have been learning this semester to

the real world in real-time.

During this event, students were placed into four negotiation groups and assigned a bargaining team representing either management or union. Each member took on a specific role in the activity to reach a contract agreement. Each group was also paired with an experienced negotiator from the Dubuque Area Labor-Management Council to help guide them through the negotiation process professionally. The goal of this workshop was to teach students how to negotiate in good faith, rather than treating negotiations as a competition. Students took value from this activity that they can take into a real-world salary negotiation someday.

Don't be afraid to take risks but recognize when something isn't working and be proactive to correct it and learn from it.


Find a mentor
