

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Conferences

I'm excited to be part of AACN's workshop, "Essentializing Your Curriculum: Moving Ahead with Competency-Based Education (CBE)." This was a one-day event, on September 27 in St. Louis, Missouri.

The AACN Essentials Conference highlighted several key themes vital to nursing education and practice.

There was a strong focus on integrating AACN Essentials into curricula for competency-based learning, as well as the importance of interprofessional education to enhance collaborative practice across disciplines.

Strategies for fostering diversity and inclusion were emphasized, alongside the role of technology in nursing, especially in telehealth and simulation.

The conference also addressed best practices for mentoring and supporting nursing students, the cultivation of leadership skills, and the incorporation of quality improvement initiatives for better patient safety.

Finally, the event provided valuable networking opportunities for me to connect and collaborate with peers in the nursing field.

Summer Camp

This past summer, a hands-on nursing experience for middle school kids was successfully launched under the UD for Kids program. Eight middle school students joined us for our inaugural voyage with Adventures in Nursing. It included many teachers including Dr. Mary Tobin, Professor Beth Neyen, and UD alumni Sam Wu and Tyler Glenski.

Adventures in Nursing covered topics such as diabetes, seizure care, blood pressure taking, TB injections, carbohydrate identification, and all campers got certified in Stop the Bleed training. Campers spent a whole day at MercyOne Hospital, Dubuque touring units and seeing real nurses in action. They also spent a day experiencing high fidelity simulation in the UD lab with Professor Neyen. Camp concluded with a cupcake party, and campers presented to a room of parents what their favorite aspects of camp were. Evaluations indicated camp exceeded expectations.

Discussions continue in the nursing department regarding how to market future nursing-focused session with UD for Kids, and thoughts are being tossed around about perhaps offering Advanced Nurse Camp next year. All campers were an absolute delight to host, and a few even came back to UD for Homecoming in October to help our student nurse association host a Student Nursing Association (SNA) Nurse booth before the football game. It truly was a lot of fun, and it fed my pediatric nursing passion. The eight middle school students were amazing and so fun to teach. I was truly blessed to spend a week with them.



Accreditation Visit

Every 10 years, we work to be re-accredited by our national accreditation body, the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

As part of this process, we write a comprehensive report about our program, and we then host on-site CCNE visitors who will verify and clarify the information we included in that report. Accreditation is an important way for our program to demonstrate what we are doing to assure our students get the most up-to-date education in preparation for their professional nursing practice.

What year did you graduate? 2023

What inspired you to become a nurse?

For the longest time, I wanted to follow in my sister's footsteps and become a teacher. My high school offered the CNA course for free and I needed an extra credit so I completed the course and began working at a local long term care facility where I discovered my passion for caring for people. I went on to work in LTC for 6 years before becoming a nurse and loved every minute of it!

Where has your degree taken you in your career?

My degree took me to St. Louis where I work as a NICU nurse at Mercy Children's hospital. The NICU was always a specialty that made me curious but our options for experience in Dubuque are very limited. I took a chance, applied, completed 4 months of training, and never looked back. The NICU is definitely where I belong!

What do you like best about being a nurse?

The best thing about being a nurse is seeing first hand that you're making a difference. Nursing is not easy. We experience some of the hardest times you can imagine, but also see miracles on a daily basis. Even after a year, I am brought to tears when getting a baby out to hold for the first time and when sending them home with their sweet families after a NICU stay! It's easily one of the most humbling professions, and I can't imagine myself doing anything else.

What advice would you give to current nursing students?

My advice for current nursing students is to take things seriously, but still make time for yourself. What inspired you to become a nurse?

I was drawn to nursing primarily for the opportunity to teach patients health management. I also thought the nursing lab looked like a fun way to combine science with social skills.

Where has your degree taken you in your career?

Nursing has taken me a few different places! I started working inpatient child psych at UIHC, then continued peds psych downtown Chicago. I decided to come back to Iowa and try working with adults doing Crisis Stabilization. Then I thought I would go back to nursing roots and try my hand at med/surg, and I just recently began a new position in ICU. I also taught a semester of med/surg clinical last Spring. I plan to enroll in a masters program next year so I can teach nursing students full time eventually!

What do you like best about being a nurse?

My favorite parts of being a nurse is the balance of nurturing care we provide as well as the critical thinking utilization. Prioritizing patient cares and balancing their medications as well as educating patients and their families about the illness and treatment plan is a fun way to put my skills to the test. I don't think I have ever left a shift feeling bored!

What advice would you give to current nursing students? I would tell current nursing students to schedule study time so it is possible to balance fun time! Nursing school is super stressful, and stress management is just as important and a lifelong requirement.
